Dear fellow *Kentones*. It seemed like an age waiting for Bournemouth and then it came and went in a flash. Firstly, if you will forgive me I will run through my busy weekend and get to the *Kentones* later ... save the best till last. I sang with my 2 quartets on the Friday evening, **High Mileage**, a seniors quartet with me on lead, and **Barcode** with me on bass.

I was very pleased with **High Mileage**, as we improved our position from prelims (albeit by one place) to 9th overall, and by just 1 point (not even 1%), we missed being mic warmers on the Sunday. We were the highest scoring seniors quartet, so a shame there was no senior competition this year.

Barcode qualified in 13th place at prelims, so we did not worry about progressing to the finals, as moving up 7 places is not something I or any of us had seen. So we went on stage to have fun and enjoy the experience, and to our amazement we got to the Sunday finals! Making the finals is such a treat and is an amazing day as the hall is normally full and, with most choruses done, the attention falls to the men's finals.

After the shock and a few pints, we looked at each other and collectively said ... what the heck (altered for the sensitivity of some readers) are we gonna sing? 😂 We arranged to meet up during the Saturday night after the



chorus competition had ended, as one evening rehearsal was plenty for a men's final. Saturday morning arrived and **MaleVox**, with whom I was singing bass, had me in rehearsal at 7.50am, (a clever trick as the centre didn't open til 8!). So we started on the street, and then had around 3 hours rehearsal with just enough time to change before going on stage then off ...! I didn't get into the official picture as I was already on my way to the dressing rooms with a *Kentones* game plan running through my mind!

Saturday evening and the results were in ... **MaleVox** won silver, the one chorus medal I'd not got with them, so I was feeling like it was meant to be, especially as it was the third contest in a row with a score above 80%. A *few* pints followed.

A long walk uphill to the **Barcode** apartment caught up with me, as my ankles decided enough was enough and I just about managed to limp home, where Andy (Tenor) wrapped them in cold towels which was a huge relief. We discussed some songs we had done before, and decided on a set from 3 years ago. We also decided we

should just go out and enjoy the time on finals stage. We nearly scored the same as in the semi-finals only because we went on with a positive attitude, and considering we only meet about 8 times a year, were thrilled with the reaction from fellow finalists and those in the audience.

I would like to thank so many of you who came along to support us x.

Resuming from coming off stage Saturday morning with **MaleVox**, firstly I hope you enjoyed and got something



from being in the audience beforehand. It did mean we could go straight into the system dressed. The first of many thanks to my wife Rae for all her hard work making the waistcoats, resulting in a great new look for the *Kentones*, a look that will last many years as we still have enough material to make another 25 plus. And they work out so far at around £5 each. Also thanks go to the children's tie company that sold us 60 ties for £27.80, just over 46p each. Boy! - we looked super, and with different coloured shirts we can easily make different appearances work too.

It was great to see that Alan Lynch (ex *Kentone*) had come to support us. He ended up back stage with us and took some photos and video. I felt and was told that the relaxed pre-stage warm up, with some starts and finishes, followed by a focused walk to the stage was achieved with a good attitude, and I feel that will stay from here on.

Despite a near-empty hall as a result of our early draw, we had a really good reception. You all did great, really great, and apart from being a bit quick on the up tune, you followed our game plan. However, having said that, you kept the faster pace which meant scores on the 2 songs were very close.

Convention is a strange, annoying, puzzling



event which often asks more questions than it answers, but one thing was clear, we had super fun. Congratulations to Nick, Joe and Patric for their first Convention and to you all for your hard work and for standing up for the history of the mighty *Kentones* and delivering to as close a standard as I could have wished for.

If you play our 2022 and 2023 Convention performances back to back, it's difficult to explain why we didn't



score more than we did, apart from the different panel of judges and the scores generally being lower than in previous years. We can agree or disagree with the scores and placements, but we went to Convention to improve both, and we did just that.

Convention does give us a target to aim for each year, and does give an indication of our singing abilities, but that's all. We all know the *Kentones* are far more than a singing club, and the feeling and positivity is on the rise.

Further thanks must go to Frank Taylor and Colin Couves for such great support, Kevin for keeping us looking happy and smiling (more work needed on that Kev), to the riser team for turning up each week, sunshine, rain or snow. The tea ladies who keep us going each Thursday and the committee who put in much work

behind the scenes each month. Martin S who keeps checking who's going to what singout, Martin G and David T's work on the much loved *Kentonian* and to our Chairman Kevin. Having run a large company, I know only too well the complex nature of a large group, and the balance you bring, Kevin, is most welcome and important. Moving forward, I have already set in motion **Butterfly** as we move to a higher singing technique, and a short but fun song **Blew By You** as a quick one to add to the repertoire.

Warm-ups will get trickier but similar to those of the last 6 months, and we already have a better idea for next Convention, with a coach to take us and a meal to celebrate in the planning.

We have drawn a line in the sand for higher performance in competition, but please always remember ...

Quarteting— A Personal View

For me, Barbershop singing is a participation sport; if I am not singing I have very little interest in listening to it. I also have very little interest in belting out the last few bars of a song with no melody and no context, and I gladly leave that to the harmony junkies. Quartet singing is my delight, and I get so much enjoyment from it. I regret that I did not have time to start quarteting until I retired. It has been disappointing that there are so few chorus members willing to give it a go. It can be a very informal affair, with casual quartets coming together to sing songs they know.

Several years ago I discovered the Extreme Quarteting stream run by **BABS** at Harmony College. This involved the forty or so mixed gender participants from all over the UK learning six songs to an acceptable standard so they can sing in scratch quartets over two days. The aim is to sing with every other participant and a phone app helps you keep track of this. Finally, you have 20 minutes to rehearse with a randomly drawn quartet and sing one of the songs in a competition, before a Saturday night show is put on by the participants.

Following this, I became aware of an even more extreme form of Extreme Quarteting, organised by the **UK Harmony Brigade** in February, again at Nottingham University. This is a similar sort of set-up but with 12 songs to learn. Again it is mixed gender with about 100 participants coming from Europe and the US. If you sign up and pay the fees in September, the teach tracks and music are e-mailed and you have five months to learn the songs. You can check your progress at occasional, locally arranged gatherings. Again you try to sing with all participants and there is a scratch quartet competition. Even though you have paid the fees, it is stressed that you have to know and will be tested on the songs to quartet standard to take part, so you have to put the time in to learn the songs!

This may seem like an awful lot of work, and it is, but it is great fun. Although it is not everyone's cup of tea, if you do not take the first step and try singing with a quartet, you will never know you are missing out big time. So why not give it a go?

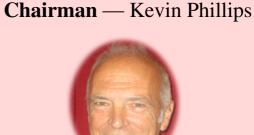
