Under the direction of John Williams, *The Kentones* gathered before the chancel steps and sang **Shenandoah** and **In My Room**, both to spontaneous applause. It was sad that Veronica was unable to attend due to ill health, but it was good to share memories of them both.

A very warm welcome to John Williams on his return to **The Kentones.** Like John, I was part of the 2009 intake, and his article jogged fond memories of that time.

I recall seeing an advert in a local paper inviting men to come and learn to sing barbershop. I knew very little about this form of singing but, as the Club was based not too far from where I lived, I went along to see what it was about. I had not really sung since my voice had broken (a long, long time ago!) so I was very nervous walking through the door on that Thursday evening. I can still recall that feeling.

I should not have worried, there were many other "newbies" and we were all made very welcome by members of the Club. We were introduced to the Music Director, a guy from Bolton called Mike Corr. Like John Williams, he had sung in the Chorus and had made the transition to the MD role.

Some of the other members listened to my voice, and after the initial shock of having to sing on my own, I was placed in the Leads.



This meant nothing to me, until I heard the others, who were either Basses, Tenors or Baritones. All very different sounds.

We then listened to the Chorus, and I was blown away by their harmonies and wondered whether I could ever produce such a lovely sound. We were given sheet music and a teach track CD for the song **Mary Lou**, and



asked to practise at home. I was told to let Mike know when I was confident singing it, and he would arrange for me to sing it to him with three members singing the other parts.

So after a few weeks of learning, I thought I would try my luck. My first attempt was useless, I forgot the words. At the second try I ran out breath! I was disheartened, and decided, with advice from my wife, to give a third try a miss.

However, the following Thursday, a certain Frank Taylor said 'Hey John, want to give it another go tonight?' I explained that I did not feel ready, but he was persuasive, so off I went with him and, according to Frank, sang the song very well. At tea break I was introduced to the Chorus as a new member of the Lead section - I had passed my audition. So it is Frank's fault that you have had to put up with me for over 12 years!

During this time I have enjoyed countless sing-outs, Convention every year (except during lockdown) and trips to Den Bosch in Holland, and loved every minute. As we all know, it isn't just the music, it is also about the friendships.

The following "Class of 09" members are currently still with the Chorus, which I think is amazing:

John Everson - Still a member despite some continuing health issues.



Kevin Phillips - One of our reliable tenors and our Chairman.

Flight of Fantasy

It all started many years ago, when I used to take my son to air shows – Biggin Hill, RAF Manston, International Air Tattoo etc. I was always smitten with the Spitfire and the iconic sound of its Rolls Royce Merlin engine. The only aircraft (apart from Concorde) that you can instantly recognise just by the sound of the engine, without peering skywards first.

Fast forward years later, and along came a Spitfire modified as a two seater, which enables members of the public to not just fly in this iconic aircraft but to pilot it as well (under guidance of course). *'Fly a Spitfire'* soon became an entry on my bucket list of all the things I want to do before I depart this world. Over the years I have continually let friends and family know that one day I was going to fulfil my dream. They had obviously been



listening, as on my 70th birthday in 2021, they presented me with the best present of all, a flight in a Spitfire!

I booked the flight for June 12th 2022 and subsequently spent the following months wishing my life away waiting for my big day to come around. I was also becoming apprehensive with thoughts of 'what if' etc. The countdown soon turned into days,

and eventually I received my final joining instructions. My anxiety now turned towards the weather and whether it would be good enough for me to fly.

Sunday June 12th 2022 arrives, and I drive down to Headcorn Airfield (formerly RAF Lashenden from 1942-44) to meet the company that organises it all – Aero Legends. I park the car and see her waiting for me – a Mark 9

Spitfire PV202, built in 1944 at Castle Bromwich, with its Merlin 66 V12 27 litre engine. The sun is shining off her gloss paint work, and her nose is standing proud at a 45 degree angle. I'm getting goose bumps. A 78-year-old aircraft ready and waiting for a 70-year-old kid! Firstly, I have to deal with the boring bits. Fill in and sign numerous forms and watch a 30 minute briefing video (which include instructions in how to throw youself out of the cockpit in an emergency!).

Then I change into the flying suit, boots and gloves supplied by Aero Legends, and wait until I'm called. After many trips to the loo (sorry, its my age!), it's soon



my turn, and I'm called to a briefing with the pilot, Charlie Brown. With his distinctive handlebar moustache, Charlie has the look of a typical World War II Spitfire pilot. He tells me that he had a 40 year flying career with the RAF and is now a flying instructor. He has probably flown more Spitfires than I've had beers, so I feel I'm in good hands.

He asks me where I would like to go during my 30 minute flight. We study the map and it is no contest. A fly-by of the **Battle of Britain Memorial** at Capel-le-Ferne, near Folkestone, is a must, as is the old RAF wartime base at Hawkinge, near Dover: during the war this area was known as **Hellfire Corner**. Up the coast to Ramsgate, cut back across to Canterbury and then have a bit of fun, before returning to Headcorn.

Our route sorted, I manage to get into the cockpit, but it's a bit of a squeeze. Honest - it's nothing to do with my size. It is cramped and there are no soft furnishings (or creature comforts or in-flight refreshments). I also have a parachute fastened to my back which doesn't help, and I constantly check it is there, feeling which handle to pull in an emergency! I ensure the harness is clicked in, put my feet on the rudder pedals and make sure my hands are well away from the stick - it's dual control - so, as the pilot moves the stick, it can come right back into my stomach. I put on my helmet which has an inbuilt mic so that I can hear Charlie. He gets in, quickly sorts himself out and I hear his voice in my earpiece, 'Ready to go'.

Red lights on my dash come on, there is a whirring sound and the prop starts to turn. The engine fires immediately with a bit of flame from the exhausts, and then clouds of smoke, which I also get in the cockpit. Charlie tells me: "Nothing to worry about old chap, it's normal." Yeah, right!

A big wave to my watching family out of my opened cockpit and we pull forward, with a bit of bumping as we roll over the grass out to the holding area. I can hear the conversation of other aircraft over the radio, talking to Headcorn ATC. Then Charlie asks me to close the canopy, so I run through the procedure - lever down, seat fully down, wind the canopy fully closed, seat fully back up again. I speak to Charlie:



"Confirm canopy fully closed."

Cleared for take off, we roll forward and the engine opens up. Wow, what power! Those 12 pistons don't hold back, and we are bumping down the grass runway very quickly. I feel the rear wheel coming up from the grass almost immediately, and we are now level. The undercarriage is already starting to retract and we are only a few feet off the ground. In a matter of no more than 200 metres we are airborne.

We sail over the main A274 road and continue climbing to our ceiling height of 3000 feet. It's a bit lumpy, the aircraft dropping and 'bumping' every now and again – just a little bit concerning!

I look down as we bank left – oooh!, I don't like that - then level out again, thank goodness. I pick out the M20 and the McCarthy Glen shopping centre in Ashford. Very soon I can see the coast up ahead. We enter a small wispy bit of low cloud – more bumpy bits as the aircraft dips and rises – a 'Mummy/Daddy' moment! We fly over the Channel and Charlie tells me that over to the right we can see the coast of France. Then the famous Goodwin Sands, where at low tide enough sand appears for some bright sparks to play a game of cricket, until the tide comes back in and covers it.

I look down at the gauges to see what's happening, and when I look back up again all I can see is sky, no ground- just 360 degrees of blue sky. "What the ****"! Charlie has decided to do a little bit of aerobatics – a full 'wing over' right above the **RAF Battle Of Britain Memorial** at Capel le Ferne. I'm not expecting it and feel a bit queasy – apparently it's the mild G-forces - but fortunately I have no need to use the bag!

The four bladed propeller is painting a perfect circle out front, and I get a fantastic view of the famous memorial down below. No doubt anybody looking up at us is enthused by the sight and sound of a Spitfire. Dover comes into view, along with the big ferries going to and from France. Charlie banks again – nope, I still don't like it - and we head up to the North Foreland lighthouse at Ramsgate, then back inland towards Canterbury – with a lovely view of the city.

Before I know it, we are heading back towards Headcorn. A 'drop wing' flypast for all the family – I wave like hell but no one sees it! We turn in for landing and the wheels come down with a gentle bump. We seem to glide in, touch the grass initially and bounce over the surface. Safely back on the ground again, I open the canopy and

start waving frantically at friends and family watching from the fence.

Charlie says that he will do a very slow, close runby for the family, and even stops so videos and pictures can be taken – thank you Charlie. We taxi back to our initial start position and the

engine is shut down. Steps are brought up, and after more photos and shaking of hands, I exit the plane. I am exhilarated, and deep down I really want to stay where I am and go back up again. Maybe I'll have to put a *'Fly a Spitfire - Again'* entry on my bucket list. Flying a Spitfire is an experience you will never, ever forget. You're re-



enacting history, the sights and sounds of which must never be forgotten. If you, too, are thinking of giving it a go - my advice is, do it. Life is far too short!

Sub - ed's footnote

Bob's article evokes happy memories of my own Spitfire flight (from Biggin Hill) in 2018. As he rightly says, it's an unforgettable experience.

On the basis that you can't have too much of a good thing, I repeated it a few weeks ago - this time with some exciting variations, such as flying through Tower Bridge, "buzzing" the Houses of Parliament and the Shard and attempting a "touch and go" landing on Blackheath. Sadly, having misread the altimeter, the latter resulted in a serious crash. Fortunately, however, no damage was done as all these daring exploits were performed on terra firma in the Spitfire Simulator at Manston (where my son is a part-time instructor.)

The "sim" provides a totally realistic experience, both visual and sensory, and the graphics of your chosen flight path show every detail of the landscape - even down to moving traffic on the roads far below. (It's also considerably less expensive than the real thing!)

Whilst in the rear seat of the actual aircraft, there are only a few instruments and controls, you get the full package in the sim, so you're kept very busy. One of the trickiest operations is raising the undercarriage after take-off without causing the aircraft to emulate a bucking bronco. The throttle is on the left of the cockpit, with the control column ("joystick") in the centre and the undercarriage lever on the right, thus requiring a swift but smooth "change hands" action. Due to this, it was said back in the day that a novice Spitfire pilot could usually be identified by a "see-saw" motion of the aircraft on take-off. I'm sure my own effort on this occasion would have been particularly spectacular...!
